- "The Argentine Senate has passed a new bill. It seeks to **abolish** income tax not for everyone, not for all workers but for most of them. Around 1.3 million workers in the formal sector will benefit from no taxes. For them, only a tiny fraction will keep paying income tax. Those who earn more than five thousand dollars per month. They will have to pay an income tax that's around 1.7 million pesos. And how many people earn that much in Argentina?"
- "Just one percent of the **payroll** workers which means 99% of all payroll workers in Argentina will not have to pay income tax. The bill will now head to the president's desk. Once he signs it, it will become law."
- "Is this even possible? Why is Argentina doing this and how will it affect their economy? If governments want, they can abolish income tax. For example, the UA does not have income tax nor does the Bahamas or Monaco. But these countries have **avenues** to make up. The UAE has oil, Monaco has yachts and casinos, the Bahamas, their **tourism.** What does Argentina have? None of these."
- "Argentina's decision is **political**. Their presidential **elections** are next month and the Finance Minister is a candidate. The same Minister who introduced this no income tax policy is running for president. His name is Sergio Massa. The sitting president and his **coalition** are supporting him. Just one problem though."
- "He is losing. Masa came third in the primary vote last month. So what does he do? Go on a **spending spree**. He has increased financial **handouts**, given more Social Security checks, raised the salary of government employees and now ended income tax. How much with all of this cost? According to some economists, 5.7 billion dollars. The problem is Argentina does not have this money. Their plan is to print more **currency**. It's always a bad idea if you print more **notes**. You will create more **inflation** and Argentina's inflation is already 124%. So ideally, they should be spending less. They should be increasing taxes instead."
- "Argentina's new government takes charge in December. They can easily reverse this by then but also by then the damage could be done because Argentina is **renegotiating** a **bailout** with the IMF."
- "The original deal was for 44 billion dollars. Out of this, around seven and a half billion has not been transferred. The IMF says show us progress only then will you get the money. But with decisions like this one, I'm not so sure and the IMF has commented on Argentina's no income tax policy. It says it adds to the country's challenges. In other words, you're not helping your case. Does this mean **reducing** or abolishing income tax is a bad idea?"


