

People who **stutter** are living lives. All over the world, it's said that about 1% of the global population stutters. Here in Japan many of them face difficulties from a lack of understanding. In our next report, we look at an **initiative** that helps people who stutter **overcome** or cope with their speech disorder.

This **pop-up** cafe opened on the campus of a university in Hiroshima prefecture. Its name is Slow Order Cafe. Those who work here are stutterers ranging from high schoolers to college students.

The cafe was opened by Yata Kensho who stuttered when he was three. He began to show **symptoms** of what medical professionals call Child Onset Fluency Disorder. At junior high school, classmates **teased** him. After entering college, he wanted to work part-time in customer service but no one would hire him. Then, he found this Cafe project that is part of a nationwide initiative to give stutterers an opportunity to gain **hospitality** experience.

On opening day, about 100 customers with reservations visited the cafe. First, they were given some **pointers**. Yata also served customers for the first time.

Taking orders is not Yata's only job today. He spoke with a child who has the same speech **impediment** to share his thoughts and give some advice. Yata says the experience of working at the cafe has made him become more willing to take on new challenges in life.
